MINISTER'S MESSAGE

'Jesus said to her, "Mary." She turned toward him and cried out in Aramaic, "Rabboni!" (which means "Teacher").' John 20.16



The conversation between Mary and Jesus on the first Easter Sunday has all the freshness, spontaneity and wonder you would expect from such an unlikely encounter. With the benefit of hindsight we take it for granted that Jesus rose from the dead three days after his crucifixion. The prophets said he would and so did he. Why were the disciples so slow to understand?

Of course things look very different up close and as they happen. People don't generally recover from death. In fact no one has ever died so conclusively and risen so vibrantly as Jesus, rendering that event unique in human history and of transforming significance to salvation history. And it's not just that Jesus pulled off another miracle...

The resurrection of Jesus confirms the efficacy of his death as a ransom for sin. To defeat death Jesus had to be perfect because death is the consequence of sin so, where there is no sin, death has no grip. And to pay the price for sin Jesus had to live a perfect life because the only adequate sacrifice is a perfect one. So Jesus' death and resurrection pays the price for sin and opens the way to heaven. What a gift!

No wonder Christians are excited about our message. There are plenty of other religions and philosophies which will promise you a good life or a better hereafter but only Jesus delivers a remedy to sin and an invitation into God's New Creation.

As we look forward to life after lockdown, let's not stumble into it as if we've been hibernating and suddenly it's time to wake up. Let's plan to harness the opportunity to learn lessons, enjoy a fresh start, do some things differently while relishing getting back to others that are cherished and sorely missed. Our priority must be renewed commitment to our mission, hence all the fuss about Alpha: PLEASE GET INVOLVED!



CREATION CARE CORNER

We are living in a time of crises: Covid, Brexit, fake news, biodiversity loss, climate change, and gross inequities within the human populations of the world. It is easy to add the lack of spiritual direction and hope in society, but are we, as a Christian community, clearly demonstrating the direction and hope that we have through faith in our loving, omniscient, omnipotent Redeemer?

The number of hungry people in the world has been increasing since 2014. In 2019, 690 million people were undernourished, 144 million children were stunted due to malnourishment and 38 million were overweight. For the same year, Scotland had a persistent poverty rate of 12%, or 16% for children (19% in England). Since then, the pandemic has exacerbated societal inequities. Scotland currently wastes about one third of food from production through to households.

Meantime, demands for more and ever-cheaper food for rich countries are driving forest clearances, with loss of wildlife habitat and reduced biodiversity, increasing vulnerability to extreme weather impacts and further pandemics. The well-publicised Australian floods are affecting areas devastated by last year's terrible wildfires. Less well-publicised are the many disastrous weather events in third world countries, with loss of lives, homes, and jobs. Forced migration, conflict and mental health sequelae are all too common.

We are living in a time of multiple assaults on, and insults to, God's creation. God's people are needed to do his work, bringing love, peace and hope to a troubled society. Ecocongregation Scotland (ECS) provides guidance, ideas and support for churches to make a difference in their own communities and beyond. Strath and Sleat Church joined ECS a few months ago, so we can embrace their mission of discovering what it means to care for God's creation in prayer, worship, and conversation; and then putting that care into action, desiring to live justly in a transformed world.

We are not called to fix everything on our own, but to let God work through us. There are many things we can do individually to become less wasteful of resources and more respectful of our environment, but what can we do as a church community?



One idea is to develop the Broadford Church grounds. To show that we care about our environment and the wider community. Suggestions have included planting fruit trees or bushes, placing bird feeders, growing colourful flowers and shrubs, and establishing a 'sit-ooterie' at the back. The grounds are not extensive, and there are some issues to sort out, but potential advantages include: making the church site more attractive to passers-by, increasing biodiversity, growing local food – perhaps for the food bank, inviting other community groups of adults and children to join us and share the space, and having a place to relax, socialise or worship. This could open up more outreach opportunities.

KILMORE WINDOWS

Despite the fact that there have been a few hold ups in the project to replace all the windows in Kilmore Church, we are almost there!

The delays have been partly due to covid related problems in supply of materials and the associated effect of that on contractors' schedules. In addition, during the work, further necessary repairs were identified which had to be dealt with. These were:

- The replacement of 6 balcony joints which were found to be rotten
- The replacement of the lintel in the vestry toilet
- Re-pointing of skews in vestry toilet
- Replacement of lead to skew of south facing gable
- Waterproofing of the belltower (to prevent further water ingress)
- Waterproofing of the south facing gable

The outside work is now complete and the scaffolding was removed last week. All that is left to complete is the internal finishing work to three windows; the one above the pulpit, the one in the vestry and the upstairs one in the south gable. These windows have had a water ingress problem for some time and some of the extra work done has been to remedy this. However, we won't know for some time if this has been completely successful, although the signs are good. In the meantime, we have been advised not to complete the internal finishings in order that the situation can be monitored and the windows finished properly at a later date. In the meantime they will be given a temporary plywood finish for cosmetic purposes. This work will be done in the week beginning 5th April so the work will be completed by the end of that week.

Of course, this extra but necessary work has come at a price and we have a projected deficit of approximately £12000 for the financing of the project. We therefore hope to do some more fundraising in the months that lie ahead, including the relaunching of our online appeal which brought in the amazing sum of (approximately) £14000.

We do so look forward to being able to gather in Kilmore once again so that we can experience the benefits of the work done! With a great big thankyou to everyone who has helped in any way.

SURVEY & CHURCH RE-OPENING

We really appreciate how generously people responded to the survey (74 people returned their survey questions!) For reasons of confidentiality, we can't share the whole survey but we will be sharing the highlights in the next newsletter.

Moving forward, we will open up gradually, starting with Broadford church after the Easter holidays. We will broadcast on Zoom from here and there will be a booking system in place for the whole parish. Please note numbers will be very limited due to social distancing and priority will be given to those currently unable to attend online. Kilmore will also open up once the building work is complete. Kyleakin is likely to open up once restrictions have lifted further (currently too few could attend given the space). Elgol will open in May.

Singing and fellowship are still not permitted. Booking details will be in notices nearer the time.
