we should not be impatient to see them filling coming to faith and journeying on outside the church. How should we respond? Elsewhere in this newsletter I offer some thoughts about why I think it is important to belong to a church. But maybe we need to think creatively about how to engage those who will never bring themselves to commit in this way?

If there is merit in becoming more agile in our operating as well as in our thinking, then changing our constitution may help. This also is discussed, following up an article in the previous edition of this newsletter. The unitary Constitution, as it is called, is being commended to all congregations and is designed to reflect recent changes in the law affecting charity trustees, as well as helping congregations to work more efficiently and therefore more effectively.

Of course, the effort involved in reforming our administration is only worthwhile if it enables us to be more faithful witnesses and followers of Jesus. Two articles, which are relevant to this, address the issues of prayer and overseas mission. Nothing useful is possible without prayer and so I trust we shall be attentive to our Prayer Co-ordinator Mary Fennell's promotion of this year's National Prayer Weekend. And I trust there will be a similarly enthusiastic response to the twinning opportunity we have with a church that is on the front-line of refugee support, working with Muslim neighbours in the heart of the Middle East.

So not many dull moments in Strath & Sleat! Please get excited and get involved – and let us know what God is doing in your life or in your part of the parish...

They were wherever they were needed; from working the power point and volunteering to do the devotions at one of our pre-club team meetings, to helping and encouraging the kids, cheerfully agreeing to being stuffed inside a dustbin to read out jokes, making up actions to help us sing the songs, and being doused in water while reading out a weather report! It was great to be a part of something which involved people from four different churches (the Free Church, Grace Church, Catholic Church and Church of Scotland) all coming together and creating a space for the kids to learn about Jesus in a simple way that was also fun.

UNITARY CONSTITUTION

In the previous newsletter, Jean Gillies announced the Kirk Session's proposal to move Strath & Sleat's constitution (the structure whereby we govern ourselves) from the old 'Model Constitution' to the newer 'Unitary Constitution', in line with Church of Scotland policy. This move is being driven by the developing responsibilities of trustees. At the moment our trustees belong to both Kirk Session and Congregational Board, with all of the Session automatically belonging to the Board. But that is not the case the other way



round (ie not all Board members are elders). This means that whenever the Kirk Session makes a decision, all trustees are responsible for that decision even if they are only on the Board and therefore had no part in it. This is not fair!

There are other advantages which the proposed change might bring, not least the efficiency of having one leadership team and not two. In her article, Jean described how the new system would operate, with the Kirk Session guiding the policy of the congregation and its decisions being put into effect by a network of committees (or action groups, as some prefer to call them). According to church law, every congregation must have, at least, a Kirk Session, a Treasurer and a Finance/ Property Committee (this is known as a 'Standing Committee'). In addition a congregation may have any number of 'Ad Hoc' committees, appointed to carry out particular tasks, whether regular or occasional (eg Young Church, Pastoral Support, Fundraising). Anyone may be appointed to these committees/ action groups, even non-members. Each should have a clearly defined remit and a budget, so they can be left alone to get on with their task.

I trust you can discern the advantages of working this way? We are not changing our beliefs or values but rearranging our structure to be more inclusive and effective in putting them into practice. All the current members of the Congregational Board who are not on the Kirk Session have been consulted and have given the initiative their blessing. And no one raised any objections to Jean's article. So does that mean that everyone is happy to move ahead? To be honest, nobody got in touch to say what a wonderful idea this is, either! However, if we are to press ahead, the next step would be to call a congregational meeting for this specific purpose, at which the proposal to change the congregation's constitution would be presented and, if a majority votes in favour, it will happen. It is on the agenda for the next Kirk Session meeting so watch this space and, if you have a view on the matter, why not express it in a letter to the editor?

CHURCH MEMBERSHIP

Recently the Kirk Session spent a whole evening exploring the topic of membership with the Minister - and emerged none the wiser! That being the case I am trying a different approach, putting pen to paper so to speak, in order to bring us all to a common understanding of what it means and why it matters.

Like joining a shinty club or a trade union, church membership is about commitment. It is a public statement that tells the world that the person in question believes in the organisation they are joining enough to become a part of it. As Paul reminds us in the Bible, just as a body is composed of members, so those who join the Church become part of the "body of Christ". And, of course, the great thing about body parts is that all are different and all are necessary.

Yet despite these advantages, the fact is that people aren't joining like they used to, neither sports clubs nor churches. There are various reasons including the fact that, in an age of endless choice and constant mobility, people dislike tying themselves down. Another reason is that those who have grown up in one church and then moved somewhere else don't necessarily want to join a new one, especially if it is of a different denomination. But probably the major difficulty in our own case, in Strath & Sleat, is that we belong to a denomination whose heartland (central belt) and style (broad) appear opposed to our own highland, evangelical traits.

While it is fair to say that the Bible does not mention "membership", it has plenty to say about "commitment" and Jesus looked for followers who were prepared to leave everything behind for his sake and the Gospel's. We may consider the church to be more of a movement than an institution but that should not put us off committing. Or we may feel unhappy about decisions being taken by our governing bodies (Presbytery and General Assembly). But following Jesus is about being faithful where we are and joining the church we attend is an expression of that. Membership also gives us the right to speak to those in authority about things we don't agree with!

It may well be that you don't feel ready to make the degree of commitment to the Lord Jesus which joining his movement, the Church, implies and no one should feel unduly pressurised. It is also desirable that a congregation should keep a generous "fringe" of enquirers, who feel comfortable about coming along to explore issues of faith and meaning without being pounced upon. But, as Minister, my concern is for believers to draw ever closer to God and to one another, growing in grace and maturity. And, for this to happen, it helps to be on the park rather than hanging around on the touch-line!

CHURCH TWINNING

Previous editions of this newsletter have introduced the prospect of Strath & Sleat twinning with St Paul's Episcopalian Church in Amman, Jordan. Alastair Sutton, a friend of the Minister with links to St Paul's, has visited on a couple of occasions to explain what is involved. Overseas twinning, especially where it involves working with other denominations and faiths, is a core policy of the World Mission Council of the Church of Scotland: to encourage every congregation to find its place in the worldwide Church of Jesus Christ, as well as being his faithful witnesses where we live and work.

St Paul's has a remarkable ministry to Christian refugees from Iraq and we were originally drawn to it for that reason, out of a desire to make our contribution to the crisis which continues to paralyse so much of Europe and the Middle East. The church is helped by Sunni Bedouins, who are Muslim, rendering the project inter-faith as well as interdenominational. In case that sounds alarm bells, let me stress that there is no blurring of the boundaries between faith groups in terms of religious conviction. But through working together in a humanitarian cause, significant learning opportunities arise, not to mention growth in mutual respect.

Strath & Sleat has made a formal application to the Twinning Department of the World Mission Council. The next step is for St Paul's to do the same. In the meantime, the

aforementioned Alistair Sutton is gathering a group of re-settled families from the Middle East in order to bring them to Skye, so that we can begin to learn about what we can expect to find when the twinning gets underway.

It is likely that, if successful, financial support will be made available to bring across a delegation from St Paul's. Accommodating our fellow believers in our homes and families will initiate personal contacts which can be developed though a return trip. Some people worry that such exchanges are an extravagance that would be better used by sending money. But the evidence is that our suffering sisters and brothers draw greater strength from our presence than our presents!

Another concern is that this initiative will distract from the overseas relationships we already have, to Hope & Faith and the various missionaries we support.







Aonadh Crìosdail Shlèite


