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

THIRD HOPE AFRICA

We are two months into our training programme with the twenty ex-child soldiers we are working with this year. We are providing a course in Sustainable Agriculture in the Tropics and supplementing that with vocational training in carpentry and tailoring. It is a joy to work closely with the six women on the course and to get to know them individually, as we plant trees together and learn how to use a peddle sewing machine. I've not got the hang of it yet - more practice needed!



We've also begun a course on Peace and Reconciliation, tackling the tough and challenging issues that the journey of forgiveness brings up. This course is based on the restorative justice practised by the Truth and Reconciliation Committee in post-apartheid South Africa. The content of the course is touching deep issues and we are counterbalancing that with drama and music sessions. We are also working on a simplified version of the Requiem Concert, translating some of the songs into Acholi. We intend to perform this on International Child Soldier's Day on 12th February and the group are really enjoying rehearsing that.

Meantime the trees are continuing to grow, and some are starting to bear fruit. Oh, and we have a pregnant donkey! Well we think we do — it's hard to tell with donkeys! If a foal arrives, we shall surely send a photo. The community here on the Model Farm is growing and we are now ten adults, two of whom are ex-child soldiers, and eight children. We're learning to share our lives together and support one another through the daily challenges of life here. We hardly know Christmas is near, however we do know the nearness of the One who was born at this time!

The Go-4-it idea emerged following a Mental Health Conference run by the church back in November in Kyleakin which some of our congregation attended. The inspiring speakers, mostly practitioners from the NHS mental health services, helped us to consider ways in which we as a community and a church could get more involved in addressing issues such as isolation, loneliness and poor mental health.

A concept like the choir or art classes will work well, we hope, as it can attract folk from across the community creating a common link. There is no requirement to have prior experience and essentially we just hope people will have fun, enjoy a good singalong and create new friendships.



In March a pop-up Art class will take place with Julia Christie which will probably look at still life for its first session. Depending on interest it may become a regular event. Whilst we don't want to start too many things at the same time, we would be interested to ear of other ideas which may be popular and also to share ideas with other parts of the parish.

The next meeting of the Community Choir will be on Monday 18th February, in the church community rooms.

The Benefits of Giving Thanks

In the book, "Charlie and the Chocolate Factory", Willie Wonka issues five golden tickets so the five lucky winners can enter his amazing chocolate factory. God has issued at least seven billion golden tickets, and you're one of those lucky recipients. You've been chosen to enter God's amazing world.

- A world where water falls out of the sky.
- A world where ants build hills.
- A world where water melts, drips, freezes again and makes icicles genius!
- A world with magnetic poles so compasses point north.
- A world in which a string sounds a note and then when you halve the string's length, it sounds the same note a perfect octave higher – what are the chances?
- A world in which you can skim stones across water it's magical.
- A world of puns and rhymes and rhythm and alliteration a world in which words are fun.
- A world in which music can make you cry


You have no reason to be bored in God's world

Giving thanks is a powerful act. We all too easily focus on what we lack and feel discontented. A thousand adverts are designed to reinforce that feeling so we buy the products they offer. But gratitude redirects our thoughts away from the trifles that we lack and towards the amazing blessings that are already ours. Sunshine, birdsong and friendship are all waiting to be enjoyed, to be relished – and all without requiring any payment. And that is before we begin to count the blessings that are ours as children of God. The key that unlocks this treasury of joy is gratitude.

Even more significantly, gratitude lifts our eyes from the gift to see the Giver. In other words, gratitude leads back to God. Jesus once encountered ten lepers who cried out to him to have pity on them. Jesus sent them to the priest, the person who could certify that they had been cleansed (Luke 17:11-19). As they

went they were healed. One of them returned to Jesus, threw himself at his feet and thanked him. At the end of the story all ten lepers were former lepers. But only one was with Jesus. Only one was enjoying communion with Jesus. And what had drawn him back to Jesus was gratitude. Gratitude may not affect our physical location. But it will bring us close to God, the great Giver.

All the things we enjoy, says John Calvin, are "ladders by which we may ascend nearer to God." "God," he says, "by his benefits, gently attracts us to himself, giving us a taste of his fatherly sweetness." But Calvin also warns,



"There is nothing into which we more easily fall than into a forgetfulness of him, especially when we enjoy peace and comfort."

Think back over the past week at all the good things you have enjoyed. Identify five things to give thanks for. A specific number helps you to think harder about how God has been kind to you. Imagine each on being handed to you as a gift from you heavenly Father. One way we relate to the Father is to receive these things as his gifts — to thank him for these things, to look for answers for prayer, to tell other people how he's provided for us, to celebrate every good thing as his provision.



We attended Nethy Bridge harvest service on the Sunday and enjoyed an Explore session with the Nethy Bridge youth leaders.

They all had a great time and on the last night we enjoyed a fireside singalong out in the grounds where we got to teach the Nethy Team a couple of Gaelic songs too!

Trips away are such an important part of building relationships and strengthening faith. We would love to go away again given the chance and it might be nice to have a parish trip to include the new Kyleakin youth group too. The chalets are pretty old and worn now but a couple of nights on an uncomfortable bunk-bed is part of the experience! Nethy Bridge is currently about to being on a well-needed new and fully accessibly accommodation block. So that led us to toying with the idea of an adult trip too.....watch this space!

Nativity Service at Kyleakin

In Kyleakin Sunday-school we have been continuing to travel through the Bible, making a time-line. But since the October break we took time out to prepare for Christmas by making some papier- maché nativity figures. Each week we looked at the individual people who were there at the birth of Jesus and tried to imagine what it must have been like for each one of them at the time.





For our Family service on the 23rd December, some of the Sunday school read the story from the books of Matthew and Luke (very beautifully!) while others helped the younger ones to use the figures to act out the nativity story. As we heard the familiar words we tried to imagine we were hearing them for the first time, and appreciate afresh what a truly amazing story this is.

Macleod's visit to India October 2018



We were in India from Monday 15 to Thursday 25 October. Officially I was on Study Leave, which is a scheme operated by the Church of Scotland to encourage ministers to keep our grey matter working. There is an annual allocation of £200 and two weeks, which can be accumulated to a maximum of 7 years-worth. Since returning to parish ministry, after my years as a

military chaplain, I have been developing a project under the grandiose title of 'Christian Responses to Post-Modernism'. I started in New Zealand because two friends of ours had just gone out to revive student outreach in what was being billed as "the most secularised (ie post-religious) country in the world". My research consisted of criss-crossing the country in a campervan, interviewing everyone I met: on the road, in churches, around universities. Alongside occasional signs of renewal, my overwhelming impression was that Christians in New Zealand were looking to the USA for inspiration, which struck me as bizarre because, statistically, America is the least secularised western country.

So 5 years later we investigated, camping and driving from Boston on the east coast to Seattle on the west. This time we were struck by the sheer variety: some communities were deeply religious, others were rampantly materialistic. And we were impressed by how versatile churches and Christians are in sharing their faith, whatever the circumstances. At the end of the trip we enjoyed the opportunity to visit Regent College in Vancouver, where I was able to share my experiences with the staff and gain some perspective on what I had observed. The complexity of the situation left me with an appetite to explore a place where the church is breaking new ground and making disciples of those who

have never heard the Gospel before. My opportunity came when I was invited to return the visit of an Ethiopian pastor whom I had recently hosted on behalf of Tearfund.

This time, another 5 years on, just Somerled and I ventured forth, for a whirlwind tour of Christian self-help groups in a mixture of urban and rural settings, well off the beaten track. For a fortnight we never saw another white face but every day we met people whose lives and communities had been transformed by the church and by the Gospel of Jesus; Hallelujah! The inspiration for how the Evangelical Kale Heywet Church of Ethiopia approached its mission came from India. So, guess where we were going next?...

And so to our sojourn last October. We landed in Chennai (which used to be called Madras), where the apostle Thomas introduced Christianity, making it one of the first places in the world to be evangelised. Our guide was a Hindu gentleman, who made it his business to teach us everything we know about what is, after all, the dominant religion in that country.



Far from feeling put upon, we enjoyed his candour and were quickly impressed by how instinctively multicultural India is, despite the attempts by the present government to impose Hinduism. From Chennai we travelled west and south on a mixture of trains, cars and aeroplanes encountering Muslims, Christians, Buddhists and Hindus all of whom were candid about their faith and wanted to learn about ours. Our itinerary took in Bangalore, which prides itself on being the tech capital of southeast Asia, and Kerala, whose claim to fame is as the "Venice of the south".

For all that, my personal highlight was a scruffy place called Sri Ranga Patna, because it is where a direct ancestor was awarded a medal for his role in overwhelming Tippoo Sahib, the local strongman and nemesis of the British colonialists. More respectable was the thrill I felt, walking in the footsteps of my favourite theologian. Lesslie Newbigin was a Church of Scotland missionary, who arrived in South India during the 1930s and stayed. During his service he learned Hindi, was ordained a founder bishop of the united Church of South India and became the father of missional theology, which is a way of contemplating the Bible and communicating the Gospel which anticipates how society is changing. When he arrived back in Britain during the 1980s Newbigin was horrified by materialism but gratified by the accuracy of his predictions.



So, where to next? That would be telling! In the meantime, I have enough to be getting on with making sense of what we have recently experienced and the more immediate challenges and opportunities facing us in Strath & Sleat and in our twinning with St Paul's Church in Amman...

Stop Press announcement that funding has come through for a two way visit to St Paul's Episcopal Church in Amman, to get our twinning underway.

There will still be a significant amount of fund-raising to do, so I am planning a sponsored walk which I hope will raise the necessary.
